What is CivicSpark?

- Governor's Initiative AmeriCorps program.
- Dedicated to building public sector resilience capacity.
- Inaugurated in 2014-15 service year.
- Places Fellows across California to support local projects.
- Projects support emerging environmental and social equity challenges.









Why Capacity Building?

- Well-being depends on community resilience.
- CA faces widespread and persistent challenges.
- The state has set ambitious goals
- Resilience depends on local government planning and implementation.
- Local governments lack necessary "resilience capacity" to respond.
 - Limited Resources.
 - Unprecedented threats.
 - Need for integration.



What do We Mean by Resilience?

- A community's ability to thrive in the face of turbulent environmental and social equity disruptions;
 - *Minimizing negative impacts to all;*
 - Capitalizing on opportunities for all;
 - Preserving ecosystem health and services for all.







LGC is the overall Program Manager for CivicSpark.

The CivicSpark team is a partnership between multiple parties.


- Corporation for National and Community Service

 - On the ground direct service to local agencies.

 - Host and/or supervise Fellows project work.
 - Identify projects, receive support, provide funding match.
 - Local public agencies, NGOs, regional collaboratives.

CivicSpark Fellows build capacity through four core activities.



Gap Assessments

- Fellows interview staff and review key documents to determine current resiliency needs relevant to their thematic track.
- Fellows use this info to finalize project goals and scope.

Service Projects

• Fellows complete specific research, planning, or implementation project(s).



Volunteer Engagement

 Fellows support increased volunteerism in conjunction with their project(s).

Transitioning Expertise

 Fellows sustain progress by providing training to staff and sharing results with key stakeholders.

CivicSpark fellows are doing great work for their host agencies and communities.

- Climate Action Plan Implementation
 - Measures in more than 12 communities!
- Disadvantaged Communities Involvement Program
 - Strengths and needs assessment, resources in Santa Ana River Watershed!
- Regional EV & Fuel Cells
 - Accelerating adoption of alternative fuels market in the North Coast!
- Sea Level Rise Adaptation
 - Research and adaptation plan for the City of Alameda!
- Water/Energy Nexus
 - Audits and savings in San Mateo County schools and public buildings!
- Affordable Housing & Sustainable Communities
 - Technical assistance for AHSC grant program!



CivicSpark is making a lasting impact throughout California.

- Over the past four years, CivicSpark Fellows provided more than 360,000 hours of service to over 170 public agencies through 350+ projects supporting a wide range of actions:
 - 22 vulnerability assessments;
 - 32 climate or energy action plans;
 - 97 water efficiency surveys
 - 134 climate action policies;
 - 155 energy reports and benchmarking assessment;
 - 280 community workshops;
 - 1,861 water monitoring surveys and reports;
 - Over 3 million gallons water saved;
 - And much more!

CivicSpark is leveraging resources to multiply impacts for California.


- Fellows directly engaged over 15,500 community members.
- Over 95% of completed projects met or exceeded goals.
- CivicSpark matches about \$1.5 million annually in local funds.

 - Clear, suitable scope of work;
 - Commitment to implementation;
 - Strong connection to public agencies need.
- Commitment to Fellows growth and development:
 - Direct project oversight;
 - Dedicated Fellow supervisor:
 - Determine Fellow's strengths,
 - Set professional goals,
 - Conduct performance assessments,
 - Provide development opportunities.







CivicSpark Public Agency Eligibility

Significant Community-Wide Burdens

- CalEnviroScreen >33;
- Distressed
 Community Index
 >50;
- Unemployment above state average;
- Regional Opportunity Index (People or Place) below state average.

Absence of an Adopted and/or Up-to-date Strategy

 Lack of a plan, element, etc. that comprehensively addresses the target resilience issue with appropriate funding, programs, and policies, to implement the strategy.

Defined Resilience Capacity Gap

 Evidenced by at least 1 significant program, policy, or planning goal for a specific resiliency issue that has not been /cannot be met without resource or system development assistance.





2019-20 Fiscal Contribution

CivicSpark is funded by CNCS and Partner Match Funding.


| Cost | Project Support | Additional Benefits |
|----------------------|----------------------|--------------------------------|
| \$51,000 / 2 Fellows | 11 Months | 160 project prep hours |
| | 2,600+ Project Hours | 200 volunteer engagement hours |
| \$26,000 / 1 Fellow | 11 Months | 80 project prep hours |
| | 1,300+ Project Hours | 100 volunteer engagement hours |

NGOs and state agencies can contract directly with LGC for CivicSpark Fellows; projects must have a defined local agency "beneficiary."

Important Dates for 2019-20

- Now: Application is open!
- March 15, 2019 First Priority Deadline for project applications.
- May 3, 2019 Second Priority Deadline for project applications.
- June July, 2019 Rolling application, Fellow matching, and Service Agreement period.
- August 23, 2019 Service Agreements and Capacity Assessments due.
- August 25, 2019 Service year begins with Fellow orientation.
- September 3, 2019 Local project work begins! Fellows begin work on Gap Assessments.
