To address some of the challenges, we are creating a Stakeholder Engagement Plan to establish roles, collaborate with stakeholders to fill in information and data gaps, and use it as a platform to share resources, expertise, and feedback to help us carry out the technical aspects of the asset-level vulnerability assessment. There are currently three main groups who will drive the development of the assessment: Project Team, Working Group, and Stakeholder Groups.

What is the degree of exposure or environmental stress an asset will experience under a certain climate



What are the social and economic importance of an asset that is critical to the vitality and well-being of the region?



How sensitive is the asset's current condition to respond and cope with the stress of a particular climate-related impact?



What is the asset's capacity to adapt to the changing needs and conditions of the climaterelated impact?
